

REGENERATION & TRANSPLANTATION Eugene Korschelt Edited and with a preface by Bruce M. Carlson

Professor Eugene Korschelt, a well-known German zoologist at the University of Marburg, was one of the great scientific encyclopedists of the early 20th century. His volumes of regeneration and transplantation summarize these fields at a time when a great deal of phenomenological information had already been uncovered, but experimental and theoretical analysis was still in its infancy. The volume on regeneration was published in 1927 and describes a wide variety of regenerative phenomena through a large spectrum of animal species, plants and even inorganic crystals. Transplantation (1931) is treated in the broad biological context of the preimmunology era, with both a large section on transplantation in invertebrates and a second volume of transplantation phenomena and techniques in vertebrates. The latter range from the grafting of embryonic organ primordia to the autotransplantation of human skin and bones.

PSYCHIATRY A Textbook for Students and Physicians Emil Kraepelin Edited and with an introduction by Jacques Quen

It is not unusual for Kraepelin to be referred to as the Father of Descriptive Psychiatry. However, to do so is to misrepresent the state of earlier psychiatry, as well as to misconstrue Kraepelin's actual contributions. This English-language translation is based on the sixth (1899) edition which was the first to contain and compare his conceptions of dementia praecox and manic-depressive psychosis. It should go a long way towards correcting the many misconceptions of Kraepelin's unique position in the growth of psychiatry as a science.

QUESTIONS OF LIFE Diary of an Old Physician Nikolai Ivanovich Pirogov Edited and with an introduction by Galina V. Zarechnak
